County Business Patterns is an annual series that provides economic data by industry for companies with employees.

The series excludes data on self-employed individuals, employees of private households, railroad employees, agricultural production employees, and most government employees. Non-employers account for nearly 3/4 of all businesses and roughly 3% of business activity in terms of sales and receipts. Beginning in 1998, data are tabulated by industry as defined in the North American Industry Classification System: United States, 1997 (NAICS).

In accordance with U.S. Code, Title 13, Section 9, no data are published that would disclose the operations of an individual employer. However, the number of establishments in an industry classification and the distribution of these establishments by employment class size are not considered to be disclosures, and so this information may be released even though other information is withheld from publications. Employment-size classes are as follows A - 0 to 19; B - 20 to 99; C - 100 to 249; E - 250 to 499; F - 500 to 999; G - 1,000 to 2,499

Those employers without a fixed location within the state or of unknown county location are included under a "statewide" classification. This incomplete data causes only slight understatement of county employment.
